

## **Geographic Changes to CKSD Locations Covered by this Permit**

- **S9.E.5:** Attach a notification of any jurisdictional boundary changes resulting in an increase or decrease in the Secondary Permittee's geographic area of coverage during the reporting period. (Required annually, S9.E.5)
  - **Changes to the CKHS/CKJH/TRANSPORTATION Complex:** The Science Kit Building, New Frontiers Secondary School, West Alternative High School, Food Services/Warehouse, Litehouse, and the Transportation buildings on this collective campus were demolished in 2017. These geographic sites are temporarily under the control of the SKANSKA contracting company. These geographic sites on the campus will still be a part of the CK middle school/CK high school campus after construction is finished. This construction project is to build brand new middle school and high school buildings in a different location on the same campus. Once that is finished, the presently standing high school and middle school buildings will be demolished as well. The services whose buildings were already demolished on this campus have been relocated to other buildings on different campuses within the school district. The sites on this campus where buildings were demolished will either become sports fields or part of the landscape. There will be no overall geographic decrease or increase to this campus overall, but the appearance of this campus is what's changing. Essentially, the only buildings left on this site are Central Kitsap High School and Central Kitsap Middle School.
  - **Changes to Silverdale Elementary/Maintenance Building/Operational Services Center complex:** Currently, Silverdale Elementary and the Maintenance Building are not covered by this permit. The requirement for a location to be incorporated into a permit is for the collective staff and student count to equal/exceed 1,000 people on any given day. In 2017, the Operational Services Center was built just to the north of the maintenance building. Now, Silverdale Elementary, the Maintenance Building, and the Operational Services Center are located on a collective campus that is owned by the school district. Several services that used to have buildings on the CK campus have been relocated to the Operational Services Center. These services include Food Services, Library Services, Science Kit, Transportation, and the Warehouse. In addition to this new building, there will be a modular addition added to Silverdale Elementary in summer of 2018. Our Capital Projects department predicts that we will see a 25% increase in population for student and staff within this elementary school. I recently conducted a head count of all student and staff collectively for these three buildings. This count included all maintenance workers, teachers, teaching assistances, students,

administrators, bus drivers, custodians, lunch personnel, summer helpers at maintenance, and the additional population that will end up being at Silverdale Elementary starting in September of 2018. Even so, there are still not 1,000 or more people expected between these 3 buildings (estimate is around 865 people). The addition of the OSC was an increase in the district's geographic area however, so I thought it would still be worth noting. An additional head count will be conducted once the 2018-19 school year is underway, and then we will know for sure how many people will be at Silverdale Elementary with the new addition. If the head count does indeed end up being 1,000 people or greater, our district will need to add this campus to our permit, which is the main reason I have included this information here. I was also notified by Ben Billick with Ecology on March 13<sup>th</sup> that this space may need to be covered by a different type of permit, which is the Industrial Stormwater Permit. I will work with him on this to make sure that our district is doing everything that we need to do.

- **Addition of Barker Creek:** Our school district purchased the old Teletech building located at 1400 NE McWilliams Road in Bremerton in 2016. The building remodel took a while, and this building did not become occupied at all until spring of 2017. Now, all of the alternative school students attend school in the Barker Creek Community School half of the building (from New Frontiers and West Alternative, which used to be on the CKHS/CKJH campus). In the other half of the building, which is known as the Teaching and Learning Center, several administrative departments from throughout our district have been relocated here. This includes Career Tech ED, Curriculum & Instruction, DIS, Health Services, Special Services, Student Services, and Teaching & Learning. Even though there are now several departments, as well as the alternative schools, occupying this building, there are nowhere near 1,000 people on this site collectively. I just thought it would be good to include this description because it gives insight as to where some of the previous services that used to be on the CK complex have relocated to.

I only recently learned that this was something that she usually did. There have been trainings given in the past, but just not last year. I did speak with the previous person in my position though, and it sounds like there was talk of switching to an online version of training for stormwater topics through SafeSchools. Our district has switched to these trainings for the most part because it can be difficult to get everyone to attend a single training, especially since people are so spread out throughout the district. I will make sure that this is implemented in some form in 2018 though. The issue in 2017 was in the position switch over.
